A Word from Kelly...



Dear Chapter Members,

We live in a time when electives are being siphoned out of the school system and "No Child Left Behind" has caused students to leave behind their creativity, enthusiasm, and passion for learning. Just when it seems that all hope is lost,



the <u>Dream Project</u> has stepped in and created a context for learning that gives relevance to math, science, social studies, history, and language arts that engage even the most apathetic student to take part in this service-learning

curriculum.

In 2006, I attended the United Nations NGO/DPI Conference (Non-Governmental Organizations/Department of Public Information), along with NGO representative/WNBA member Jill Tardiff and Marilyn Berkman. At the conference Jill Tardiff introduced me to the United Nations Millennium Development Goals, a blueprint that was created and agreed to by all the world's countries and all the world's leading development institutions. The UN Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) state that by the year 2015, the world will:

- 1. Eradicate extreme poverty and hunger
- 2. Achieve universal primary education
- 3. Promote gender equality and empower women
- 4. Reduce child mortality
- 5. Improve maternal health
- 6. Combat HIV/AIDS, malaria and other diseases
- 7. Ensure environmental sustainability
- 8. Develop a global partnership for development

During this conference I was struck with the idea to introduce the MDGs to schoolchildren. I wondered if the very solutions we were all looking for might be in the untapped mind of an inner city child. My "aha moment" quickly became The Dream Project, a grade 6-12 educational program that empowers students to discover and invent solutions to the MDGs. Students learn to see themselves and relate to one another as leaders that embody global responsibility, compassion, and a desire to create a world that works for everyone. The Dream Project is committed to bridging cultures and connecting youth by utilizing media, arts and technology within its curriculum.

This past March, I traveled with ten students from Celerity Nascent Charter School in South Los Angeles, and founder and director of the school, Vielka McFarlande, to Honduras to meet the President and First Lady. It was a life changing opportunity to witness these inner-city kids from Los Angeles stand in front of the President and First Lady and present their solutions for the Millennium Development Goals.

This trip resulted in "Pocket Change for Change," a student-led program that raises awareness and funds for schools in developing countries.

A documentary with an original sound-track will be released late this Summer and a reality show with a group called Crossing Boarders is in pre-production.



June 1, Judy Lopez Award Ceremony

WNBA-LA members and members of the Judy Lopez Memorial Foundation, gathered on Sunday June 1, at the UCLA Faculty center for the 23rd annual celebration of the Judy Lopez Award of Excellence in Children's Literature.

Following a reception and dinner (and amazing cookies!) Immediate past president Ruth Light kicked off the festivities, tracing WNBA's origins as an organization of women, founded in 1917 to give women access to the world of books, to what WNBA is today--a flourishing organization, with new chapters emerging all across the nation.

On occasion of the award-winning children's books, WNBA president Kelly Sullivan Walden briefly spoke about the <u>Dream Project</u>, an educational collaboration between LA schools and the UN, empowering young people to find solutions to the United Nations Millennium Development Goals for 2015.

"Only children still have the imagination and the belief that anything is possible, so they still have the power to make a difference," Kelly said.

The five children's books, honored that night, proved a case in point. On the background of war, hunger, political, religious, and racial discrimination, the authors told compelling, personal stories of young adults coming into their own by following their beliefs.



Gary D. Schmidt, who won first prize for his book "Wednesday Wars," explained that he drew his inspiration for the story from his own childhood, especially his interest in the slippery transition all young people have to face--that is to turn their gaze from childhood to adulthood, from values instilled by their upbringing and social environment, to the formation of their own beliefs and views of the world.

Following final remarks by Ruth Light, the event concluded with a book signing and sale of award-winning books.

Jill Tardiff (past National President and UN NGO liaison) has been instrumental in creating a groundswell of enthusiasm and support for National Reading Group

Month (October.) We have the support of many major publishers including Penguin, Simon and Shuster, Random House, among others.

The Dream Project update (as mentioned above) was met with cheers and tears. I am so grateful to the WNBA for being the catalyst for this amazing and life-changing program.

We also discussed the ways in which we can provide additional member benefits for the authors in our organization that are also speakers by teaming up with Speaker Services.

MEMBER HIGHLIGHT--JULY 2008

Kelly suggested I'd get this new feature started, and so here I am: a complete newbie to the world of books, with no illustrious successes to report, except for becoming a member of WNBA-LA. So I decided to share the long of this story

with you.

I grew up in a small village in the Black Forrest, the cradle of Grimm's fairytales--and that's where I spent most of my childhood, riding broomsticks, and chasing imaginary elves.

This might have fueled my desire to move to the place where fairytales were churned out by the dozens: Hollywood. (Or so my mom's tabloids let me to believe.)

"I want to be in the arts," I began to tell everyone in town, when they asked if I was going to take over my

parents' pharmacy some day. "Being an artist" sounded right to me. I just wasn't sure if it wasn't a better way of saying, "I always want to be a kid and play in the woods!"

To my surprise, it was my grandmother, a stern woman, as pragmatic and German as they come, who pointed me to an article about the Lee Strasberg Theater Institute in Hollywood.

"They accept international students," she said, and she encouraged me to apply. So I did.

To my surprise, I was accepted. Two days after my high school graduation (I had just turned 19) I left for Hollywood.

After three months of perfecting my skills to avoid the stage, I realized I didn't want to be an actress, but I also realized that I didn't want to return home. I'd actually found a passion writing scenes for my fellow actors. So I told my parents I needed more time. 3 months became 6, and then 9.

At that point, I knew I wanted to be a writer, so I applied to UCLA film school in the screenwriting discipline. I got accepted. It was clear to me then--and I believe my parents as well-that I was not coming back.

In film school however, I realized that the stories I was interested in made horrible screenplays. They all dealt with human psychology--especially the psychological dissonance between people's inner thoughts and desires, and what they actually said and did. Screenplays were all about the action though. There was no place for inner thoughts or the psychological conundrums winding around in our brains everyday.

"It would make a great book," my teachers kept saying.

Well, I'd always been a very reluctant student when it came to trusting my gut, so I decided to first obtain a Master of Fine Arts in screenwriting from AFI, to realize that screenwriting really wasn't for me.

When I sent my first short story to my screenwriting fellows though, hoping to receive some feedback, they sent it right back to me, saying, "This is not a screenplay, so what do you want me to say?"

I realized then, that I had to start from scratch and find friends in the world of books. So I created a list of professional organizations, related to the book industry, and sorted my way through their offers and benefits.

The list suddenly became very small, because most of them were situated in New York, and all important events took place in New York. Also, most of them sounded like big, impersonal corporations, categorizing members according to levels of achievement, worthiness and unworthiness, and their membership fees!

"I'm a starving young writer," I cried.

HOLLYWOOD

Then I came upon WNBA. I couldn't find much on the LA chapter (because they didn't have a website and newsletter yet:)), so I contacted Ruth Light. She promptly sent out a brochure, and continued sending me invitations to local events.

Browsing the brochure, I became excited. This association seemed so different. A truly eclectic forum of men and women, who, above all, had come together to share their love for books. There was a warmth to this organization, that all others had been lacking.

Following Ruth's friendly reminder, I attended the gathering at Dutton's bookshop in April, 2008.

When I arrived I saw a lively group of people standing outside Dutton's. The word "WNBA" fell, and a fish out of water, I approached. Five minutes later, I found myself in the middle of it all, chatting and exchanging phone numbers. It was like home.


Since this day, Ruth, Kelly, and other members have taken me under their wings and I want to express my

My book is called "The Downfall of Oliver Hepz," (c) and it is the tale of a man who goes to a place that doesn't exist. It is a fantasy, but not as fantastical as say the Harry Potter series. (I greatly admire JK Rowlings' ability to invent magical ideas!) I think Oliver is a personable fellow whom my readers will enjoy meeting and rooting for on his journey. About a year ago, I was introduced to one of the producer partners of Deep Muddy Productions at an ASCAP awards dinner for film composers. (I am a professional songwriter, specializing in lyrics). She invited me to lunch, during which we spoke of unfinished manuscripts. I drew her into my story, and she fell in love with Oliver's character and said she thought she might like to "write him" in a film. So I let her read my rough of the first 200 pages. She then arranged for me to meet her partners, and, fired by their enthusiasm, I got to work finishing the manuscript (it's about 88,000 words). Now they have optioned the book for a feature film! Development is ongoing at this time. No, the novel has not been shopped to book publishers as yet, as I'm still honing and revising. I've learned that re-writing is almost as important as writing!

Idle Waste

With gas prices going up, drivers have responded accordingly. The Transportation Department states that Americans drove 400 million fewer miles in April than they did in March, and 1.4 billion fewer miles than they did in April of 2007.

But sometimes getting behind the wheel can't be avoided. But instead of idling in traffic, which burns more gas and releases more carbon dioxide into the atmosphere, turn off the ignition at long stoplights and other lengthy hold-ups. And rather than using the drive-through, just park and go in.

Stop the Dripping



There are currently 400 million people worldwide facing severe water shortages, according to the United Nations. By 2050, that number will be 4 billion. Meanwhile, an enormous amount of water is lost through seemingly minor drips around the house. A leaky faucet can lose up to 20 gallons of water a day, while a leaky toilet can flush an extra 200 gallons every day! What's worse, the toilet could be leaking and you might not even know it! To

test for a leak, put five to ten drops of food coloring in the tank. If ten minutes later there's coloring in the bowl, you've got a problem. In general, do whatever it takes to fix the leak in your sink, bath tub, toilet, garden hose.
