As every year, we had several "featured authors/poets" who added charm and liveliness to our booth. Those were:

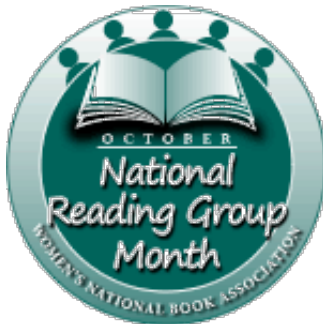
- \*New member Sharmagne Leland-St. John-Sylbert, who displayed and sold her books and played a wooden flute that captivated everyone around her

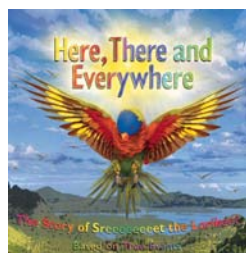

## MEMBER HIGHLIGHT--OCTOBER 2008



### WNBA October Member Highlight - by Mira Tweti

What a month! More accurately, what a year! Last year this time the illustrations for my self-published children's book, (Here, There and Everywhere) the first for kids introducing them to parrot-welfare issues, were finally completed. Artist-extraordinaire, Lisa Brady, worked for six months (between paying jobs) to produce over 30 pieces of lushly colored, exquisite, and lifelike renderings.



When I saw them I knew we had to get the book out in time for Christmas - that Christmas. With less than three months to do it and no printer, and no idea what I needed to do other than getting it in book form, we embarked (I should say I embarked, Lisa sat safely on the sidelines cheering me on and offering good guidance) on a journey fraught with problems at every turn. Not the least of which was lack of



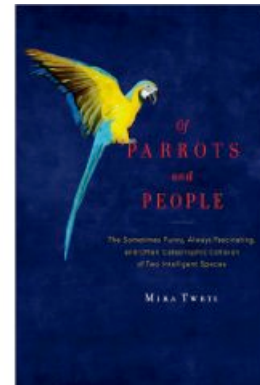
funds. Literally. Long and interesting story short, the advance sales generated by word-of-mouth from the avian rescue community, friends, and others familiar with my animal welfare journalism, generated enough money for us to pay the printer, and fill the orders. The first 1000 copies of the beautiful, hardcover, full color book was delivered in 25 boxes at my front door on December 15th and was shipped out until midnight Christmas eve (for Christmas day delivery!). It helped rescues and parrots around the country by giving them a beautiful Christmas gift they could sell, that educated children while it generated revenue for them.



I'm still proud of the fact that the book benefited unwanted, neglected, and abused parrots from the first book sold. I knew nothing about publishing before this and now I was a publisher with an imprint: Parrot Press. And I started the Parrot Press Donation Program, which in three short months had 26 avian and animal welfare organizations as members. If you're determined to help, where there's a will, there's always a way though you will be exhausted by the time it's done.

Now a year later, Here, There and Everywhere is in Barnes & Noble, Borders, and zoo gift stores around the country. It has gotten rave reviews and amazing endorsements from Dr. Jane Goodall, the Humane Society of the U.S., Birdlife International, and many others. And, my new book Of Parrots and People: the Sometimes Funny, Always Fascinating, and Often Catastrophic Collision of Two Intelligent Species - five years in the research and writing - has just been published by Viking.

Of Parrots and People began life as an award-winning Los Angeles Times Magazine story. I did so much research (one of the reasons it took so long to complete) Publisher's Weekly called it "astounding." I'm proud of that and that I didn't settle for a less thorough examination of the issues when I could have been done sooner. The book would still have been plenty good but definitively not as good as it is now.



My recent PR efforts took me on an exhausting, but thrilling, 10-day book jaunt to the east coast starting in Norfolk, Virginia, and ending in Providence, Rhode Island. I spoke to 600 children of all ages at a Long Island public school (none want a parrot as a pet now) and 300 bird lovers at a parrot club. I gave a presentation at my alma mater, Hunter College in Manhattan, and visited with important people in the animal and avian welfare communities to generate word-of-mouth. I have also finished a film, "Little Miss Dewie: a Duckumentary, and started research on my new book about avian rescues, which will cover chickens and ducks as well as parrots.



Little Miss Dewie is about an orphaned duckling I found and took home to my apartment in the summer of 2007. I fed her and kept her warm and then started calling avian rescues and animal shelters around town to place her. I know a lot of the avian rescuers up and down the west coast but I discovered it wasn't so easy to place a duck. It was almost as hard as placing an unwanted parrot. There were rescues or people willing to take her but the former were way stations, not permanent housing, and the latter weren't ideal.

I figured since I found her, it was my responsibility to find her a great home. But I had no idea what that meant for a duck. So Dewie lived with me, pooping and honking her way around my apartment and my life for two months while I figured it out. I fell in love with this worm-loving (they slurp them up

like spaghetti strands) beauty and almost couldn't part with her but for the fear of eviction.

Friends met her and while they thought I was crazy for keeping a duck in my apartment (I took her out for "play dates with nature" so she could run on the grass) they also thought they'd never seen such a unique relationship and urged me to get it on film.

My neighbor, JP Sarro, who I only casually knew then, was a work-at-home editor, and I recruited him (easily when he saw the situation) to document our relationship. The rest is now video history.

Two books and a film all in play at the same time may be something to be proud of but it's nothing to envy. I'm in a perpetual state of exhaustion. It's the nature of publishing and producing. The projects don't end. You may finish writing but then you're in editing and proofing. The book may be out at the printer but then you're doing PR to get the word out in anticipation of its arrival in final form.

Now that Dewie is nearly done with editing and post production we're in distribution mode, submitting it film festivals - over 40 to date -- almost a full time job.

I'm personally proud of how the film turned out and the advance reactions have been stellar. It's hilarious, sincerely touching, unique (many have said they'd not seen anything like it before), and yet covers important animal welfare issues almost by osmosis from the screen to the viewer. Men and women have both cried at the end. You can't ask more than that. But we've gotten more: within a few weeks it was accepted into two festivals. The Other Venice Film Festival and the International Film Festival of Egypt 2009 (or as I put it, Dewie goes to the pyramids). Amazingly, both these acceptances were based on a rough cut viewing of the film because we couldn't have made their submission deadlines otherwise!

Now I'm actively doing press for all three projects. I did feature film PR for a living for many years and handled several projects at once but then I was at studios or companies where there was a support staff. I wasn't doing it all on my own as I am now. Viking is working on PR for Of Parrots and People book and gotten a few things but far and away the majority of press activity--a Los Angeles Times profile running this week, the Washington Post feature and review, a Boston Globe feature, and a KCRW interview (to run 9/4) about pet ducks--were all done on my end. It's really par for the course I've heard. The writers I've spoken with who were published by big houses had to orchestrate and implement their own PR campaigns, and often pay for them too.

So this is my life now. I could stand a slower pace and a day off once in a while. It's been seven days a week for a few years now, but I know too well that the work doesn't sell itself and all the really hard work creating it is for naught if no one knows about it.

That said, I want to take this opportunity to invite you all to a great event for Little Miss Dewie this month. The fab new environmental art gallery G2 ([www.theg2gallery.com](http://www.theg2gallery.com)) on Abbot Kinney Blvd. in Venice is hosting an evening for it on Saturday, October 11th from 6:30 p.m. - 9:00 p.m with great (vegan, of course) food, music, a screening of the film, and a silent auction to help us raise finishing funds. Save the date and please feel free to forward this downloadable invite ([G2Gallery Invite](#)) to everyone you know! It'll be a lot of fun. The film is great and upbeat and there's no duck like Dewie.

I also want to jump-start the holiday spirit by offering a discount to any WNBA member that would like to get copies of my books. Green Halloween is a non-profit grass roots community movement to create healthier and more earth-friendly holidays. With Halloween just being around the corner, and your kids hearts' beating faster, here are a few tips to make this day special for the whole family as well as the environment.

- Throw a charity-themed party. Instead of giving out prizes for games, have your children pick from a list of charities and make a donation in their name.

- Ask your child's school to consider making their Halloween celebration green as well.

For example, hand out Fair Trade chocolate and/or informational cards on why supporting Fair Trade practices in the cocoa industry is a year' round must. Help end abusive child labor in the cocoa fields and pay cocoa farming families a fair price that allows them to meet their basic needs.
